### *What is the study of Art?*

The broad instructional concept is to integrate the components of art history, criticism, design and studio courses, university courses, Gallery Exhibition Program

and permanent collection. The student learns to interpret, analyze and make intelligent judgments about art as well as learning the skills and concepts of the Studio. A

grasp of the dynamic nature of a culture and the continuing extension of its visual language is a fundamental objective.

### *Why should I consider an Art Major?*

To understand the history, traditions and conventions of art and art criticism, for herein lies the intelligible language of art and the heritage of humankind. The B.A.Ed.in

Art will prepare you to teach this language and heritage to students, from pre-school to 12th grades.

### *Declaring an Art Major:*

Apply for a Studio major by submitting a portfolio of 12 slides in a plastic sleeve or Macintosh compatible CD ROM or online portfolio organized in a presentation format. Deadline for admission is March 1 of each year. Applications for winter or spring quarters will be reviewed on a space available basis. The deadline for winter and spring quarters is

November 1. Send portfolio to Review Committee, Department of Art, Western Washington University, Fine Arts Complex, Room 116, 516 High Street, Bellingham, 98225-9068.

The major code will be submitted to the Registrar by the Art Department at the time of portfolio acceptance.

### *Mid Program Checkpoint:*

Students intending to complete a Bachelor's of Arts in Education degree in Art-P-12 within four years should complete the following courses by the start of their junior year. Students are expected to follow all prerequisite requirements for courses and seek early departmental advisement.

To be completed before application deadline:

Complete at least **75 credits**.

Have a cumulative overall, or last 45 credits, **GPA of 2.75 or higher**.

Satisfy the **testing requirement**: Pass the WEST-B.

Complete the **English composition course** with a grade of **B** or higher.

Adequate academic **major preparation**. See an advisor from your academic major department prior to consulting with an Education advisor.

### Coursework:

Begin or prepare for adequate academic major preparation.

Complete an English Composition course with a grade of B or higher.

### Other Activities:

Seek out volunteer opportunities within the community to gain experience with adolescents and diverse populations
