#### ❖ **Raquel Montoya-Lewis to discuss 'restorative' juvenile justice**

Two WWU faculty members will discuss new juvenile justice programs at the Lummi Indian Reservation on Oct. 20 as part of a quarter-long exploration of "Children and the Law" by the Center for Law, Diversity & Justice at WWU's Fairhaven College of Interdisciplinary Studies. Raquel Montoya-Lewis, chief judge for the Lummi Nation and an assistant professor at Fairhaven, will speak about the Lummi Juvenile Justice Project along with Jason Dallmann, the project's coordinator. The year-old project has juvenile offenders complete service projects – while receiving support from drug and alcohol counselors, social workers and others – as an alternative to probation for their offenses.

The talk will be at 7 p.m. in the Communications Facility, Room 105, Tuesday, Oct. 20<sup>th</sup>.
