



**2022 Legislative Session Report  
April 2022**

*This report was developed by the WWU Office of Government Relations. WWU Government Relations works to pursue and promote Western's state and federal policy objectives to the legislative and executive branches of the state and federal government. The Office works closely with elected officials, Western administrators, faculty, students, and staff. Western's Office of Government Relations also educates the campus community about legislation and initiatives affecting the University.*

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## **Introduction**

The Washington State Legislature convened the 2022 Legislative Session on January 10, 2022, and adjourned *sine die* on March 10, 2022, the 60th day of the regular session. The Legislature conducted its business in a hybrid format, with committee meetings held virtually and floor debate held both in person and virtually. Representatives from Western Washington University testified on proposed legislation and presented to legislative committees via Zoom hearings. Additionally, Western staff tracked approximately 168 bills and submitted approximately 66 fiscal notes on proposed legislation.

This report provides a summary of legislation that passed during the 2022 Session with direct or potential impact to WWU. A complete list of bills tracked by WWU during the 2022 Session, including bills that did not pass the Legislature, can be found in Appendix A of this report.

The 2023 Legislative Session is scheduled to begin on January 9, 2023 and is scheduled to last 105 days.

## **2022 Supplemental Budgets**

### **Capital Budget**

The state's \$1.5 billion supplemental capital construction budget focused on priority infrastructure investments statewide in affordable housing, behavioral health, broadband internet access, environmental health, and projects in underserved communities. The budget also included a total of \$30 million in construction funds for public four-year higher education institutions, \$84 million for K-12 schools, and \$24 million for community and technical colleges construction projects.

- **2022 Supplemental Capital Budget investments for WWU include ([SSB 5651](#)):**
  - Electrical Engineering and Computer Science Building: \$1.5 million in local funds to offset inflationary increases in construction costs
  - Classroom and Lab Upgrades: \$1.35 million in state bond funding
  - Minor Works Program: \$557,000 in state bond funding

### **Operating Budget**

The Legislature invested an additional \$5.8 billion dollars during this supplemental budget, bringing the 2021-23 biennial operating budget total to \$64.1 billion. The supplemental operating budget included several one-time federal and state investments, including a single transfer to the transportation budget, as well as one-time investments in housing and homelessness, K-12 education, and school seismic retrofitting projects. Ongoing funding investments were also made in the areas of childcare, behavioral health, covid response, long term care, salmon preservation, higher education, and wildfire suppression.

- **2022 Supplemental Operating Budget investments for WWU include ([ESSB 5693](#)):**
  - Compensation Support: \$767,000 for institution compensation costs in recognition that these costs exceed estimated increases in undergraduate operating fee revenue. These funds are in addition to the state's prior share of compensation increases (3.25 percent across the board plus lump sum payments for WFSE and PSE as bargained), moving towards the state funding a greater proportion of the cost of compensation increases.
  - Student Support: \$1.26 million provided for student support services, including outreach and financial aid support, retention initiatives, mental health support, and initiatives to address learning disruption due to the pandemic. Funding must be used to supplement, not supplant, other funding sources for student support.
  - Nursing: \$461,000 to establish a Master of Science in Nursing program and \$433,000 to transition the for the Registered Nurse (RN) to Bachelor of Science in Nursing program from tuition-support to state-support
  - Cyber Range Poulsbo: \$769,000 to upgrade Cyber Range equipment and enhance technical support.
  - Legal Services: \$478,000 is provided to the Office of the Attorney General to increase legal services at WWU.
  - Everett compensation increases: \$33,000 is provided to Washington State University for compensation increases for WWU employees working at the Everett University Center.
  - Hazing Prevention: \$66,000 for implementation of HB 1751 (hazing prevention).

- Accessory Dwelling Unit Review: \$30,000 in one-time funding is provided for a review of how existing homeowners' associations, condominium associations, associations of apartment owners, and common interest communities address accessory dwelling units. A report must be submitted to the Legislature by June 30, 2023, including an examination of the governing documents of these associations and communities to determine how accessory dwelling units are explicitly or implicitly restricted and what the overall impact is on the state's housing supply from such restrictions.

### **Other Higher Education Budget Investments**

- \$34.27 million to provide a Bridge Grant of \$500 to all maximum Washington College Grant awardees and increases the maximum WCG award for students between 0-60 percent of the median family income. A student is eligible for a grant if the student receives a maximum college grant award and does not receive the college bound scholarship program.
- \$3.6 million for grants for nursing programs to purchase or upgrade simulation laboratory equipment in FY 2023.
- \$3 million for the Nursing Educator Loan Repayment program.
- \$1 million for the WA Student Achievement Council to administer a grant pool to support new and existing career launch programs at public four-year universities.
